L8	Q Sir, can you identify yourself for the
19	record, please.
20	A Yes. I'm Detective John Farrell from
2 7	the Fairfay County Police Department

- 1 Q And what are you your duties?
- 2 A I'm currently assigned to the Northern
- 3 Virginia Gang Task Force.
- 4 Q And how long have you been assigned
- 5 there?
- 6 A Since March of 2005.
- 7 Q And how long have you been a police
- 8 officer?
- 9 A Since January of 2000.
- 10 Q And how much -- Have you been working
- 11 with gang activity issues and working on gang cases --
- 12 gang related cases your entire -- since you've been a
- 13 police officer?
- 14 A Yes, I have.
- 15 Q What kind of training have you
- 16 received?
- 17 A I've received the basic law enforcement
- 18 training through Fairfax County. I've also received
- 19 advanced investigator training. I've been to the basic
- 20 gangs school and various gang conferences.
- 21 Q Okay. And have you ever taught gang

- 1 training to other law enforcement officers?
- A Yes, I have.
- ${\tt Q}$ And what kind of training has that been
- 4 and where at?
- 5 A I taught at the Fairfax County Academy
- 6 for patrol officers.
- 7 Q Okay. And how many -- How many inves-
- 8 tigations would you say you've been involved in since
- 9 you've been a law enforcement officer that involved --
- 10 separate investigations involving gang activity?
- 11 A I would estimate somewhere in the
- 12 neighborhood of a hundred investigations.
- Okay. And about how much of your
- 14 activity that you're involved in involves MS-13?
- A Reference to gang investigations, I
- 16 would say about ninety percent of my investigations
- 17 involve MS-13.
- 18 MR. ELSASSER: Okay. Sir, I'd
- 19 like to move that Detective Farrell be recog-
- 20 nized as an expert and qualified as an expert
- and qualified as an expert in gang activities,

specifically MS-13 activity In the Northern 1 2 Virginia area. 3 THE COURT: Any objection, Mr. 4 Bareford? 5 MR. BAREFORD: No, Your Honor. 6 THE COURT: Ms. Rafferty? 7 MS. RAFFERTY: (shaking head) . 8 THE COURT: Ms. Garcia? 9 MS. GARCIA: No objection. 10 THE COURT: All right. The 11 detective will be so recognized. 12 Okay. Sir, during the course of your investigation in some of these one hundred or so inves-13 tigations involving MS-13 that you involved yourself ___ 14 that you were involved in, was one of those Brenda Paz 15 16 case? 17 Yes, it was. Α 18 And can you tell us just very briefly Q what that case was about? 19 Brenda Paz was an informant for local 20 Α

law enforcement and the Federal Government and she was

- 1 murdered by MS-13.
- Q Okay. And was she a witness against
- 3 certain MS-13 members?
- 4 A Yes. She was a witness against Dennis
- 5 Rivera, who was a member of MS-13.
- 6 Q And in that underlying case, what was
- 7 he charged with?
- 8 A He was charged with a homicide that
- 9 occurred on Dangerfield Island.
- 10 Q Okay. And that was Federal property up
- 11 in Alexandria?
- 12 A Yes, sir, it was.
- 13 Q And, so, it was a Federal case?
- 14 A Yes, it was.
- 15 Q And Ms. Paz then was -- I believe you
- 16 said a witness in the Federal case?
- 17 A Yes, she was.
- 18 Q And she was murdered?
- 19 A Yes, she was.
- 20 Q And she was murdered while a cooperat-
- 21 ing witness?

- 1 A Yes, she was.
- Q And you were involved in the investiga-
- 3 tion of her murder?
- 4 A To a limited extent, yes, I was.
- 5 Q And certain individuals were prosecuted
- 6 for that?
- 7 A Yes, they were.
- 8 Q Prosecuted in Federal District Court in
- 9 the Eastern District of Virginia?
- 10 A Yes, they were.
- 11 Q And were certain individuals convicted
- 12 for that?
- 13 A Yes, there were convictions.
- Q Who was convicted?
- 15 A One of the individuals was Cisneros and
- 16 the second individual was -- I'm sorry -- was Oscar
- 17 Grande.
- 18 Q Okay. Judge, I have -- Okay. I'm
- 19 going to give you a copy of what's been marked
- 20 Commonwealth's Exhibit Number Fourteen. And can you
- 21 identify what those are, please.

- 1 A Yes. This is the indictment reference
- 2 the Brenda Paz homicide.
- 3 Q Okay. And attached to the back what do
- 4 you see?
- 5 A They appear to be the certified
- 6 convictions on Oscar Grande and Ismael Cisneros.
- 7 Q And these were MS-13 cases involving
- 8 Brenda Paz, the murder victim, correct?
- 9 A Yes, sir.
- Okay. Now, were the two individuals
- 11 you testified to, Grande and Cisneros, were they MS-13
- 12 members?
- 13 A Yes, they were.
- MR. ELSASSER: Okay. Judge, I'd
- like to offer these as evidence.
- THE COURT: Any objection?
- MR. BAREFORD: Could I have just a
- 18 moment, Judge. No objection.
- 19 THE COURT: Ms. Rafferty, Ms.
- 20 Garcia?
- MS. RAFFERTY: No objection.

21

MS. GARCIA: (shaking head). 1 THE COURT: All right. 2 received as Commonwealth's Fourteen. 3 MR. ELSASSER: Thank you, Your 5 Honor. The above referred to 6 NOTE: documents are now being marked and filed by the 7 Court collectively as Commonwealth's Exhibit Fourteen. Now, sir, I also have here something 10 that's been marked Commonwealth's Exhibit Fifteen, and 11 12 it's a group exhibit. I'd like you to just go through --13 and I'll go through that with you -- we can briefly ___ Tell me if these are individuals -- these are conviction 15 orders from Fairfax County Court. And I'd like for you 16 to tell us -- to identify the defendant, tell us if this 17 was a conviction resulting from a MS-13 related crime __ 18 or -- I'm sorry -- if these defendants were MS-13 and if 19 the crime involved -- related to gang activity in 20 Northern Virginia. A Reference the certified conviction of

- 1 Oscar Omar Ramos Hernandez, he was convicted of capital
- 2 murder, abduction, and rape. This was the Diana Garcia
- 3 case that occurred in 2001.
- 4 Q She was the victim?
- 5 A Yes. Yes, Slr, she was.
- 6 Q Okay. And basically what did that
- 7 involve?
- 8 A Oscar Hernandez and Omar Guzman, which
- 9 is a second certified conviction in this pile, and a
- 10 third subject, who has not been arrested at this point,
- 11 observed Ms. Garcia walking down the street. One of the
- 12 subjects believed that she was a chavala, which means a
- 13 member of a rival gang -- gang member. Based on that
- 14 information, a decision was made to take action against
- 15 her. She was dragged off the road behind an apartment
- 16 complex where she was raped and murdered by being struck
- 17 in the back of the head.
- Okay. And that was by Oscar Hernandez
- 19 and Omar Guzman?
- 20 A Yes, sir.
- Q Both MS-13 members?

- 1 A Yes.
- 2 Q And simply because she was a member of
- 3 a rival gang?
- 4 A They believed her to be.
- 5 Q Believed her to be a member of a rival
- 6 gang?
- 7 A Yes, sir.
- 8 Q All right. Can we look at -- Let's
- 9 see. We have Mr. Melendez, Jose Cruz Melendez.
- 10 A Yes, sir. That was --
- 11 Q Is that a MS-13 -- Was Mr. Jose Cruz
- 12 Melendez an MS-13 major -- member?
- 13 A Yes, he was.
- 14 Q Okay. And what did that attack
- 15 involve?
- 16 A This was a case involving -- a second
- 17 member was also convicted -- I don't see the conviction
- 18 here -- Cristobal Madrono. This was a machete attack on
- 19 Edsel Road where a rival gang member had initially
- 20 pursued some members of MS-13 to where they were having a
- 21 party on foot. The members ran out and they captured the

- 1 other gang member and they mutilated his hands with a
- 2 machete.
- 3 Q Okay. And what gang was the other
- 4 person from?
- 5 A South Side Locos.
- 6 Q Okay. Any reason for that that carne
- 7 out of that investigation and that trial other than the
- 8 fact that this was a rival gang member, which is what
- 9 prompted the attack?
- 10 A He was a rival gang member that had
- 11 initiated, according to the defendants, initiated the
- 12 problem by chasing them.
- Q Cesar Rodriguez, that's in there also,
- 14 is that an MS-13 member?
- 15 A Yes.
- 16 Q Convicted of criminal street gang
- 17 participation?
- 18 A Yes.
- 19 Q And just very briefly what did that
- 20 involve, sir?
- 21 A That was a machete, also, a machete

- 1 cutting on a subject coming out of a practice for a Sweet
- 2 15 birthday party. They were having a practice for a
- 3 dance, and Mr. Hernandez assaulted one of the individuals
- 4 after throwing up MS-13 gang hand signs.
- Okay. And, sir, let me just -- Let me
- 6 just so we can maybe move this along, I'm going to read
- 7 out the rest of the names here. Wilber Rivera, Joaquin
- 8 Carbello-Castro, Garcad Omar Diaz-Hernandez, Cristobal
- 9 Zelaya-Madrono, Cesar Jonathan Rodriguez, Joaquin
- 10 Carbello-Castro. MS-13 members case convictions ___
- 11 A Yes.
- 12 Q -- and orders that you've provided our
- 13 office in preparation for --
- 14 A (interjecting) The only cases I'm not
- 15 familiar with are the Castro and the Hernandez cases. I
- 16 don't know the particulars on those, but I do know those
- 17 two subjects to be gang members, and the other cases I'm
- 18 familiar with either having assisted in the investigation
- 19 or having spoken with an officer investigating those
- 20 cases.
- 21 Q Thank you, sir.

- 1 A These are all MS-13 gang members, yes,
- 2 sir.
- 3 MR. ELSASSER: Okay, sir. Thank
- 4 you. Appreciate that. Your Honor, I'd like to
- 5 go ahead and offer these as Commonwealth's
- 6 Exhibit Number Fifteen.
- 7 THE COURT: Any objection?
- 8 MR. BAREFORD: No.
- 9 THE COURT: It will be so
- 10 received.
- 11 NOTE: The above referred to
- 12 documents are now being marked and filed by the
- Court as Commonwealth's Exhibit Fifteen.
- 14 MR. ELSASSER: Thank you. I have
- nothing further, Your Honor. Oh, I'm sorry.
- 16 I'm sorry, Judge. One more question.
- 17 BY MR. ELSASSER: (continuing)
- 18 Q Did you corne across, during your
- 19 investigations, an individual by the MS-13 name of -_
- 20 nickname of Crimen?
- 21 A Yes, sir, I did.

- 1 Q What do you know his real name to be?
- 2 A Luis Serrano-Gutierrez.
- 3 Q And is that -- is that the Luis
- 4 Serrano-Gutierrez right over there at counsel -- sitting
- 5 next to counsel?
- 6 A Yes, sir, it is.
- 7 Q Known to you as Crimen?
- 8 A Yes, sir.
- 9 MR. ELSASSER: All right. Judge,
- 10 I'd ask that the record reflect that the witness
- identified Crimen or Mr. Gutierrez.
- 12 THE COURT: The record will so
- 13 reflect.
- 14 Q Tell me about the conversation you had
- 15 with him concerning -- Well, did you ever -- Did he make
- 16 statements to you at some point in time about Brenda Paz?
- 17 A Yes, he did.
- 18 Q And when -- Give us a time frame for
- 19 when the statements were made and ___
- 20 A This was in the course of this inves-
- 21 tigation.

- 1 Q The investigation we're here for today?
- 2 A Yes, sir.
- Q And what did he say to you about the
- 4 Brenda Paz killing?
- 5 A He indicated that members of his clique
- 6 had been involved in that homicide, and the subsequent
- 7 prosecution had eliminated many members of his clique.
- 8 Q So they were practically wiped out
- 9 because of the -- the aftermath of having killed Brenda
- 10 Paz?
- 11 A Yes.
- 12 Q And what clique was that?
- 13 A That was CLS, which stands for
- 14 Centrales Locos de Salvatrucha.
- MR. ELSASSER: Thank you, SIr. No
- 16 further questions. No further questions.

17

- 18 CROSS EXAMINATION
- 19 BY MR. BAREFORD:
- 20 Do you recall when you became actively
- 21 involved in the investigation of the death of Ms.

- 1 Angeles?
- 2 A I believe it was within a week of when
- 3 her body was found.
- 4 Q So prior to that time had you conducted
- 5 any investigation of the NLS clique of MS-13?
- 6 A I had conducted investigations dealing
- 7 with members of that clique. However, I wasn't actively
- 8 investigating NLS for any specific reason at that portion
- 9 -- at that time.
- 10 Q So did you have intelligence as to
- 11 structure or hierarchy within the NLS clique?
- 12 A As an investigative body, we did.
- 13 Personally I can't speak to what the structure of NLS was
- 14 prior to this investigation.
- So during the course of this investi-
- 16 gation, did you receive information about the hierarchy?
- 17 A Yes. At that point I began to famili-
- 18 arize myself more with that clique and the hierarchy.
- 19 Q Did you get that information from other
- 20 police officers or what was your source?
- 21 A In the course of the investigation, I

- 1 received information from other police officers who had
- 2 been more actively investigating NLS for crimes and also
- 3 from subjects involved in the case, defendants today.
- 4 Q Can you identify the officers that you
- 5 got that information from?
- 6 A One of the officers I spoke with was
- 7 Detective Storm.
- 8 Q And, so, who else would have provided
- 9 you with information about the hierarchy of NLS?
- 10 A There were other detectives from the
- 11 Fairfax gang unit that had dealt with NLS more actively
- 12 than I had. Primarily, I remember Detective Storm.
- 13 can't be sure who else I had spoken to reference the
- 14 hierarchy.
- Did any gang member, alleged gang
- 16 member, give you information about the hierarchy within
- 17 NLS?
- 18 Yes, Mr. Portillo-Chicos spoke to me
- 19 about NLS.
- 20 Q And when was it you spoke to Mr.
- 21 Portillo-Chicos?

- 1 A That was the day after his arrest.
- Q Where did that interview take place?
- ${\bf 3}$ A At the Rappahannock Regional Detention
- 4 Center.
- 5 Q Did you record that statement?
- 6 A Yes, it was recorded.
- 7 Q Does the Commonwealth have a copy of
- 8 that?
- 9 A Yes. I don't know if the Commonwealth
- 10 does. Detective McDermott was provided a copy of that
- ll statement.
- 12 Q So you provided a copy to Detective
- 13 McDermott?
- 14 A Yes, sir.
- 15 Q And, so, who was present for that
- 16 interview?
- 17 A Myself and Detective Claudia Saa from
- 18 the gang task force.
- 19 Q And did you take statements from any of
- 20 the other co-defendants?
- 21 A Reference the hierarchy or --

- 1 Q Well, reference this investigation.
- 2 A In the course of the investigation, I
- 3 spoke with Mr. Delcid and I also spoke with Mr. Serrano-
- 4 Gutierrez and also -- I had conversations with Mr. Perez
- 5 also that was assisting Detective McDermott as a
- 6 translator.
- 7 Q And, so, were your interviews with Mr.
- 8 Delcid and Mr. Gutierrez recorded?
- 9 A The interview, I believe -- I'm not
- 10 sure if those interviews were recorded. They weren't
- 11 conducted at a Fairfax County facility, so I'm not sure
- 12 what technology was employed for those interviews. I do
- 13 believe that those interviews were recorded though.
- 14 O And does that include then your
- 15 interviews with Mr. Perez?
- 16 A Once again, I believe that that inter-
- 17 view was recorded, but I'm not certain. And with the
- 18 interview with Mr. Perez, my role was as a translator, so
- 19 I wasn't responsible for setting up interview equipment
- 20 or for --
- 21 MR. BAREFORD: Thank you. That's

1	all I have.
2	THE COURT: Ms. Rafferty?
3	MS. RAFFERTY: No questions for
4	the detective.
5	THE COURT: Ms. Garcia?
6	MS. GARCIA: No questions.
7	THE COURT: Any redirect?
8	MR. ELSASSER: No, sir. The
9	Commonwealth rests for
10	THE COURT: Thank you. You can
11	step down, Sir.
12	
13	WITNESS STOOD ASIDE
14	MR. ELSASSER: The Commonwealth
15	rests for purposes of probable cause, sir.
16	THE COURT: Mr. Bareford, anything
17	you wish to present on behalf of your client at
18	this juncture?
19	MR. BAREFORD: Judge, I have no
20	evidence at this time.
21	THE COURT. All right. Ms.

1	Rafferty, anything you wish to present on behalf
2	of your client at this juncture?
3	MS. RAFFERTY: No, Your Honor.
4	THE COURT: Ms. Garcia?
5	MS. GARCIA: No evidence. Only
6	argument.
7	THE COURT: All right. Argument.
8	MR. PETERSON: Yes, sir. Just
9	very briefly. I'm cognizant of the hour.
10	THE COURT: That's all right.
11	Take your time.
12	MR. PETERSON: I would suggest
13	that the Commonwealth has shown today a lot more
14	than probable cause as to all defendants.
15	think what's clear from what the evidence shows
16	today is this is an MS-13 gang, gang participa-
17	tion, with many, many I think we only need to
18	show one predicate act we've probably shown
19	more than two dozen predicate acts; most of them
20	murders, rapes, all violent crimes as required
21	by the statute.
