3	A I have one sister.
4	Q Is she older or younger?
5	A Older.
6	Q What's her name?

8	Q I'm going to ask you to
9	tell the Judge about an incident that occurred
10	in December of 2003, during your winter break
11	from school. Do you remember that winter
12	break?
13	A Yes.
14	Q Okay. Was there something
15	significant that occurred during that time
16	period?
17	A Yes.
18	Q Okay. Can you tell the Judge what
19	happened at that time?

9	A	No.
10	. Ď	All right. Did you tell, that day
11	or the	next day, anybody about it?
12	A	No.
13	Q	How old is your father, do you know?
14	A	No, I don't.
15	Q	Approximately?
16	A	Approximately, 49, 48.
17	Q	Okay. Is it fair to say he was over
18	the age	e of 18 when this occurred?
19	A	He was?
20	Q	Yes.
21	A	Yes.
22	Q	Okay. And, you were nine years old?

1	A Yes, ma'am.
2	Q Please answer any questions that Mr.
3	Leibig has for you.
4	THE COURT: Yes, sir.
5	CROSS EXAMINATION
6	BY MR. LEIBIG:

2	Q Is it kind of like an office?
3	A Yes.
4	Q Is it your dad's office, your mom's
5	office, or everybody's office?
6	A Everybody's.
7	Q Everybody can use the computer?
8	A Yes.
9	Q Okay.
10	MR. LEIBIG: Your Honor, may I
11	approach briefly?
12	THE COURT: You may.
13	BY MR. LEIBIG:

9	REFERRED TO WAS MARKED AS
10	DEFENDANT'S EXHIBIT A FOR
11	IDENTIFICATION.)
12	BY MR. LEIBIG:
13	Q Is that a fair and accurate layout
14	of the bedroom floor, the top floor, of the
15	house?
16	A Yes.
17	Q It shows your parents' bedroom, your
18	bedroom, and your sister's bedroom, and the
19	bathroom.
20	A Yes.
21	Q Would you put your initials on
22	Defendant's Exhibit A that that's an accurate

1	roughly accurate depiction?
2	A Would I I don't understand what
3	you are asking me.
4	Q I'm asking you to just initial it,
5	so we know that that's the one you said was
6	the accurate depiction.
7	A Okay.
8	Q Okay. During the period of time,
9	did both of your parents work?
10	A Yes.
11	Q Okay. And, was it the sort of thing
12	where everybody would they would come home
13	around the same time from work, and the four
14	of you would have dinner together, that kind
15	of thing?
16	A No.
17	Q How would that work?
18	A My dad worked til like 6:00 at
19	night, and my mom was a teacher at that time,
20	she teaches pre-school, so she was home
21	earlier than he was.
22	Q Okay. He was home around 6:00?

1	A Yes, sir.
2	Q And, he would usually be home for
3	the rest of the night?
4	A Yes, sir, for the most part.
5	Q Prior to the incident you described,
6	had there been any abusive behavior from your
7	father towards you?
8	A No
9	MS. ASHWORTH: (INTERPOSING)

16	things. It would be over spilled milk, not
17	doing a chore, being in the way of the TV,
18	anything like that.
19	Q Literally, spilled milk, like if you
20	spilled some milk?
21	A Yes, or a coke.
22	Q Okay. Did he also behave that way

1	towards your sister,?
2	A Yes.
3	Q Okay, equal treatment?
4	A Yes.
5	Q Did you ever see him giving those
6	kind of looks to your sister,
7	A Sometimes I did, yes.
8	Q Eventually your father moved you
9	moved out of your father's house, right?
10	A True.
11	Q And, you moved out with your mom and
12	your sister?
13	A Yes.
14	Q Why did you move out?
15	A We moved out because they were
16	getting a divorce.
17	Q Okay. You didn't move out because
18	of what your father you testified that your
19	father had done to you, right?
20	A I had never told my mom about it, so
21	she didn't know.
22	Q Okay. All you had told your mother

1	you hadn't told your mother about the looks
2	either at that point, right?
3	A No.
4	Q Had you told anyone about either
5	event?
6	A No.
7	Q Before your father moved out, did he
8	have involvement in your life, for example,
9	attending Girl Scouts with you, anything like
10	that?
11	A No, he rarely attended anything I
12	did.
13	Q Okay. What about sports, that kind
14	of stuff?
15	A He once was my coach for softball,
16	but that's the only thing he was a part of
17	with me.
18	Q Okay. So, the way you would
19	describe it, other than the time he was your
20	coach for softball, he didn't take an active
21	role in your life.
22	A No, sir.

1	Q And, your mother did?
2	A Yes.
3	Q Were you allowed to have friends
4	over after school?
5	A Not if anyone was not home.
6	Q Okay, but if your parents were home.
7	A Yes, sir.
8	Q And, were you allowed to have
9	friends spend the night sometimes?
10	A Yes, sir.

17	A Only with my sister's friends. He

1	Q Did you speak to them about it or
2	anything?
3	A No, sir.
4	Q Did you speak to your sister about
5	it?
6	A No, sir.
7	Q Or your mother?
8	A No, sir.
9	Q You got along with your sister
10	pretty well, right?
11	A Yes.
12	Q You are close?
13	A Yes.
14	Q Four years apart?
15	A Five years.
16	Q Okay, five years apart, it's a
17	trusting relationship?
18	A Yes.
19	Q Your parents were were you about
20	13 when you moved out of your father's house?
21	A Yes.
22	Q And, your parents were getting a

1	divorce,	right?
2	A	Yes.
3	Q	Weren't getting along at all.
4	A	No.
5	Q	And, they have a bad relationship up
6	until no	w.
7	A	They've always had a bad
8	relation	ship. They've always fought over
9	little t	hings.
10	Q	You noticed that since you were a
11	kid?	
12	A	Yes, sir.
13	Q	Unrelated to anything that happened
14	to you.	
15	А	Yes, sir.
16	Q	Did you go on vacations during this
17	period of	time?
18	A	Yes, sir.
19	Q	Did you go every summer?
20	A	Yes, sir.
21	Q	Your whole family went?
22	A	Yes, sir.

1	Q Did any kind of sexual abuse happen
2	on these vacations?
3	A No.
4	Q Okay. Did your mother ever go out
5	of town and leave you alone with your father?
6	A No. The only time she left me alone
7	was when she started her work at Wegman's.
8	Q When was that?
9	A That was when I was in 9th grade, so
10	last year.
11	Q Okay. That work would be at night?
12	A Well, at that time it was training,
13	so she was during the day.
14	Q So, you were nine years old when
15	this abuse began, right?
16	A Yes, sir.
17	Q The incident you described for the
18	court, according to you, is not the last time
19	that happened, right?
20	A No, sir.
21	Q How often did it happen after that?
22	A Almost every night.

1	Q Almost every night for how long?
2	A Til about when we moved out.
3	Q So, about four years?
4	A Yes, sir.
5	Q Was it about the same every night?
6	A Yes, sir.
7	Q So, he would was there any
8	substantial difference between I'm not
9	going to make, you know, go over every night,
10	but was there any substantial difference
11	between what you described in the first night
12	and all the other nights?
13	A What does substantial mean?
14	Q Was there a big difference between
15	what happened the first night and any other
16	night?
17	A Sometimes he would use objects, but
18	that's all.
19	Q How often would he use an object?
20	A He only did once.
21	Q What was that?
22	A He tied me to the bed.

1	Q When was that?
2	A When I was about 11.
3	Q Okay. Was there ever any other time
4	when there was a substantial difference, aside
5	from when he tied you to the bed?
6	A No.
7	Q Okay. When he would come in, he
8	wouldn't say anything?
9	A No.
10	Q He would just begin to do what you
11	described?
12	A Yes, sir.
13	Q Would you sit up or remain lying
14	down?
15	A I would be lying down until he asked

4	A Yes, sir.
5	Q Okay. Did you cry out while he was
6	doing that?
7	A No.
8	Q Did you cry out on any of the
9	occasions during the four years?
10	A No.
11	Q And, during this entire period of
12	time, he didn't talk?
13	A No. Sometimes he would make
14	threats.
15	Q Just to make sure we have know
16	which time, we've talked about the first time,
17	during the first time he came in your room did
18	he make a threat?
19	A No.
20	Q Okay. Did he make any threats during

2	Q What was the threat?

6	Q Your family, you took that to mean

9	Q Did he say kill you?

12	Q And, this was pretty painful when it
13	happened, right?
14	A Yes.
15	Q Did you ever try to hit him or punch
16	him or anything?
17	A No, sir.
18	Q When he was telling you that he was
19	going to hurt you, or kill you, or kill the
20	family, was he speaking in a stern voice?
21	A Yes.
22	Q Authoritative?

1	A Yes.
2	Q Pretty loud?
3	A Yes.
4	Q That would happen at the end of the
5	two to three hours?

7	Q Did he ever touch your breast?
8	A Yes.
9	Q Would you have your eyes open most
10	of the time?

12	day when you would see your father at dinner,
13	or watching TV, or just in the house, would he
14	act normal?
15	A Yes.
16	Q Did he ever bring anything up to you
17	about this?
18	A No.
19	Q No words ever exchanged about the
20	incident ever, except inside the room?
21	A No.
22	Q That's right?

1	A	That's right.
2	Q	Did he act normal to and
3	your mot	her during this period, too?
4	A	Yes.
5	Q	Did you ever see him act with any
6	violence	towards your mother?
7	A	She was very he would scream a
8	lot at h	er.
9	Q	You never saw him hit her, though?
10	A	No.
11	Q	And, was he somebody that got drunk
12	at night	, that you saw?
13	A	No.
14	Q	Use drugs?
15	A	No.
16	Q	He always earned a living, right?
17	A	Yes.
18		MR. LEIBIG: Judge, may I approach
19	with the	map briefly again?
20		THE COURT: Yes.
21		BY MR. LEIBIG:
22	Q	When you were beginning at the

1	beginning of nine years old, would you sleep
2	with your door open or shut?
3	A I don't remember.
4	Q Okay. During the whole four years,
5	do you remember when you went to bed, you
6	would go to bed with the door open or shut?
7	A Shut.
8	Q You would shut it.
9	A Yes, sir.
10	Q Every night?
11	A Yes, sir.
12	Q And, is five years older,
13	right?
14	A Yes, sir.
15	Q Who went to bed first, normally?
16	A Me.
17	Q Okay. And, when you are 13, when
18	he's coming in your room for two to three
19	hours, your sister is 18, right?
20	A Yes.
21	Q And, she still lived there?
22	A Yes.

1	Q And, she stayed up late then, right?
2	A Yes, but she wasn't home a lot at
3	that time.
4	Q Okay. But, before she was 18 she'd
5	be home every night, right?
6	A Yes.
7	Q And, she would be asleep in her room
8	right next to yours, when your father came in
9	your room?
10	MS. ASHWORTH: Objection as to how
11	this witness would know what Heather was
12	doing.
13	MR. LEIBIG: As far as she knows.
14	BY MR. LEIBIG:
15	Q Did you believe her to be asleep in
16	the room next to you most nights?
17	. A Yes.
18	Q And, did you believe your mother to
19	be asleep down the hallway in her bedroom most
20	nights?
21	A Yes.
22	Q And, did your parents leave their

1	door open or shut when they went to bed?
2	A I don't know, I went to sleep before
3	they did.
4	Q Okay, and did Heather leave her door
5	open or shut?
6	A Shut.
7	Q Both you and Heather left them shut?
8	A Yes, sir.
9	Q When your father came in, did he
10	open your shut down, and then shut it again?
11	A Yes, sir.
12	Q You and had the same two
13	rooms growing up always, right?
14	A Yes.
15	Q And, you have a close relationship,
16	right?
17	A Yes.
18	Q Would you sometimes talk to each
19	other during the night through the wall?
20	A No.
21	Q That never happened?
22	A No.

1	Q Did you hear her doing things in her
2	room, if she was doing something, like the
3	radio?
4	A Only if her door was open.
5	Q Okay. You never heard her radio
6	playing in her room, while you were in your
7	room?
8	A No.
9	Q Okay. Who was the first person you
10	told about this,?
11	A My best friend.
12	Q What's her name?
13	А
14	Q When did you tell her?
15	A July 16th of 2009.
16	Q You didn't tell anyone in April of
17	2009?
18	A No.
19	Q Did anyone at school, or at CPS, or
20	someone from the city, ever ask you in April
21	of 2009 if you had been abused?
22	A Yes.

1	Q And, what did you say?
2	A I said no.
3	Q Okay, and to your knowledge, what
4	was the why did they ask you that?
5	MS. ASHWORTH: Objection, as to
6	whether she that she can testify as to why
7	somebody asked her the question.
8	MR. LEIBIG: Okay.
9	BY MR. LEIBIG:
10	Q Did one of your friends tell CPS
11	that they thought you had been abused, and
12	then you were asked about it?
13	A That could have been a possibility,
14	I was asked about it.
15	Q By a person from the city, from the
16	county.
17	A Yes, CPS officers.
18	Q Came to your school and asked you?
19	A Yes.
20	Q And, you said no?
21	A Yes.
22	Q And, that was after your father had
į	

1	moved out.	
2	A Yes.	
3	Q And, at that point did you think -	_
4	were you still thinking he would kill th	lе
5	whole family if you said anything?	
6	A Yes.	
7	Q Did your father own a gun?	
8	A Not that I know of.	
9	Q Never heard him talk about owning	a
10	gun?	
11	A No.	
12	Q Ever heard of him using a gun?	
13	A No.	
14	Q This was after he had moved out an	đ
15	you were separated, right?	
16	A Yes.	
17	Q So, the first person you told wa	s
18	and did you tell your mother and	У
19	time around then?	
20	A I did not.	
21	Q I'm sorry, this is July of this	S
22	year?	

1	A Yes.
2	Q And then, eventually, you did bring
3	
4	THE COURT: (INTERPOSING) Last
5	year, not this year.
6	BY MR. LEIBIG:
7	Q (CONTINUING) sorry, 2009
8	eventually, you did bring it to the attention
9	of your mother?
10	A She found out in September
11	whenever that all came out, she didn't know
12	anything of it before.
13	Q When you told your friend about
14	this, it was in July, right before July your
15	father got charged with a crime, right?
16	A Yes.
17	Q And, you heard about that, right?
18	A Yes.
19	Q And, he was charged with involved
20	pornography on his computer, correct?
21	A Correct.
22	Q And, you heard about that.

1	A Yes.
2	Q And, did that upset you?
3	A No.
4	Q Did you had you not been let
5	me ask you this, from your personal knowledge
6	was one of the reasons your parents got
7	divorced because your mother didn't like your
8	father looking at pornography?
9	A Yes.
10	Q Did you know about that at the time
11	that you guys moved out?
12	A Yes.
13	Q Okay. Did it set you back then,
14	that he looked at pornography, your dad?
15	A Well, I don't understand the
16	question.
17	Q Did it upset you that your father
18	looked at pornography?
19	A Yes.
20	Q It did back then when you moved out?
21	A Yes.
22	Q It lowered your opinion of him.

1	A Yes.
2	Q And, that was when you were about
3	13, you moved out?
4	A Yes, sir.
5	Q Okay. And, it's fair to say that
6	right when they got separated you were upset
7	about the divorce, right?
8	A I wanted them to get a divorce.
9	Q Did you ever tell anyone else that
10	you were upset about them getting a divorce?
11	A I wasn't upset about them getting a
12	divorce.
13	Q Did you at some point when they
14	got separated you didn't get along with your
15	mom too well, right?
L6	A We got in a lot of arguments.
L7	Q And, during that period of time you
18	said you wanted to move in with your father,
L9	right?
20	A I could have said that in an
21	argument, but I would never have acted on it.
22	O Okay but you did say that to your

1	mother?
2	A I don't remember.
3	Q Did you say it to some other people,
4	too, that you wanted to live with your father
5	instead of your mother?
6	A No.
7	Q But, you could have said it during
8	an argument?
9	A Yes.
10	Q Okay. You did tell people that you
11	missed your father when you moved out of his
12	house, right?
13	A Yes.
14	Q And, during this same period of
15	time, or soon thereafter, is it fair to say
16	your opinion of him was getting lower because
17	you heard about the pornography, correct?
18	A Yes.
19	Q And then, when you heard he got
20	charged with a crime, your opinion of him got
21	even lower, right?

Yes.

1	Q That was in July of 2009.
2	A Yes.
3	Q Did your to your knowledge, did
4	your friend, bring your matter to the
5	authorities?
6	A No.
7	Q How did that happen?
8	MS. ASHWORTH: Objection as to how
9	she would know.
10	MR. LEIBIG: Only if she knows,
11	Judge, if she was confronted about it in some
12	way.
13	THE COURT: Are you able to answer
14	the question?
15	THE WITNESS: Yes. We had a retreat
16	in November, and we had testimony night, and
17	I had shared with a few of the girls, and they
18	had told the pastor, and the pastor called
19	CPS.
20	BY MR. LEIBIG:
21	Q That was with your church?
22	A Yes, sir.

1	Q Okay. You shared it during a
2	sharing session of sorts?
3	A Yes, sir.
4	Q That was in November?
5	A Yes.
6	Q After that time, did you ever tell
7	anyone it wasn't true?
8	A No.
9	Q When you guys moved out of your
10	father's house, your sister was about ready to
11	go to college, right?
12	A Yes.
13	Q And then, she was gone down at ODU?
14	A Yes.
15	Q And, your mom worked more, right?
16	A Yes.
17	Q So, you were at home alone a lot.
18	A Yes.
19	Q You would make phone calls to
20	friends and family members, and tell them that
21	you didn't like being alone a lot, fair
22	enough?

1	A Yes.
2	Q Your father wasn't keeping up with
3	keeping in close contact with you, was he?
4	A No.
5	Q Fair to say you were lonely during
6	that period?
7	A Yes.
8	Q I'm going to ask you some questions
9	about the contacts you've had with you father
10	since you moved out.
11	Did you go to Ocean City with him in
12	July of 2008, right after the separation?
13	A Yes.
14	Q And, just the two of you rode down
15	together, right?
16	A Yes.
17	Q And, that would be two nights there,
18	because and the others were late
19	getting there, right?
20	A Correct.
21	Q And, no abuse or anything happened
22	then, right?

1	A No.
2	Q And, you didn't discuss anything
3	about anything, right?
4	A No.
5	Q And, you weren't afraid he was going
6	to kill you on that trip, were you?
7	A No.
8	Q You weren't afraid of him at all on
9	that trip.
10	A Only when he got angry.
11	Q Did he get angry on that trip?
12	A Yes.
13	Q About what?
14	A Someone had spilled coke on the
15	floor, and he got angry because it was all
16	carpet.
17	Q But, you didn't think he was going
18	to seriously hurt you for that, right?
19	A I wasn't sure.
20	Q He never punched you or anything
21	before, right?
22	A No.

1	Q So, on the trip that happened after
2	your parents got separated, you spent two days
3	with your dad in Ocean City, and other than
4	the anger about the coke everything was fine.
5	A Yes.
6	Q Okay. Did he take since you've
7	been separated since your parents were
8	separated, did your father take you to
9	gymnastics now and then?
10	A I don't remember.
11	Q Is that possible, though?
12	A It is a possibility.
13	Q Okay. You never told your mother
14	that you didn't want to ride to gymnastics
15	with him, or to Ocean City with him, right?
16	A No.
17	Q And then, he took you down to Kings
18	Dominion to meet your sister in August of
19	2009, right?
20	A Yes.
21	Q You weren't afraid he was going to
22	hurt you during that ride, right?

1	A	No, he was not angry.
2	Q	You drove alone together down to
3	Kings Do	minion.
4	A	Yes.
5	Q	And, you stayed at your Aunt
6	house th	at weekend?
7	A	Yes.
8	Q	Okay. Did you talk to anyone there
9	about th	e abuse that had happened?
10	А	Yes.
11	Q	And, who was that?
12	A	·
13	Q	And, you told her the truth?
14	A	Yes.
15	Q	Did you tell her everything?
16	A	No.
17	Q	Did you tell her most of everything?
18	A	Yes.
19	Q	Okay. Later that year, maybe
20	July/Aug	ust time, you asked your father for
21	some mone	ey, right?
22	A	Yes.

1	Q And, he said no.
2	A Yes.
3	Q And, that's the last time you've
4	spoken to him, right?
5	A Yes.
6	Q Before your parents got separated,
7	you didn't have any problems with depression,
8	or anxiety, or hurting yourself, or anything,
9	right?
10	A No.
11	Q After your parents got separated,
12	did you began to have problems like that,
13	right?
14	A Yes.
15	Q And, you tried to kill yourself in
16	2008?
17	A Yes.
18	Q And, you were cutting yourself in
19	2008 and '09.
20	A Yes.
21	Q And, you began to see a therapist
22	and get treatment.

1	A Yes.
2	Q And, none of that happened while
3	your parents lived together.
4	A No.
5	Q And, isn't it fair it's a fair
6	statement, that you told quite a few
7	people that the reason you were having these
8	problems is because you were struggling with
9	your parents' divorce, fair enough?
10	A Yes.
11	Q You were angry at your father,
12	correct?
13	A Correct.
14	Q And, he wasn't spending any
15	worthwhile time with you, right?
16	A No.
17	Q Do you remember meeting with
18	Detective Sansale in November 17, 2009, down
19	at the Government Building about this?
20	A Yes.
21	Q And, that was after you had just
22	closed your church group, and then CPS, and

1	then the Detective asked you to come down,
2	right?
3	A Yes.
4	Q And, you had an interview with the
5	Detective, right?
6	A Yes.
7	Q And, did you tell her the truth?
8	A I did.
9	Q And, in as much detail as possible?
10	A Yes.
11	Q Okay. And, that was recorded,
12	correct?
13	A Yes.
14	Q Did you feel comfortable when you
15	were there?
16	A Yes.
17	Q Okay. Did you tell the detective
18	that your father had tried to prostitute you
19	out?
20	A I said that he had mentioned that he
21	had a few friends, but I never said he had
22	prostituted me out.

1	Q What's the part what did he say
2	about having a few friends?
3	A That he could watch me and his
4	friends have sex, basically.
5	Q Was that on one occasion that he
6	mentioned that?
7	A Several.
8	Q Around what time frame, the early
9	part, middle part, or end part?
10	A The middle.
11	Q Is that around 11?
12	A Yes, sir.
13	Q Did you respond to that at all?
14	A I said no.
15	Q And then what happened?
16	A He dropped it, and then he kept
17	bringing it up on several different occasions.
18	Q During that same 11 year old period?
19	A Yes, sir.
20	Q And, did he give you any details,
21	like we are going to go here, and my friends
22	will be here, and this kind of thing?

1	A	No, he just said he would bring them
2	to me.	
3	Q	Into your bedroom?
4	A	Yes, sir.
5	Q	You took it to mean into your
6	bedroom i	n the middle of the night?
7	A	Yes, sir.
8	Q	Did he mention anybody by name?
9	A	No.
10	Q	Do you know any friends that he has?
11	A	No.
12	Q	Is it dark when he would come into
13	your room	?
14	A	Yes.
15	Q	Lights out?
16	A	Yes.
17	Q	He wouldn't turn on the light.
18	A	No.
19	Q	You couldn't see, for example, to
20	read a bo	ok, let's say.
21	A	No.
22	Q	And, you couldn't see to like look

1	at a picture, let's say.
2	A No.
3	Q Did he ever show you any pictures?
4	A Yes.
5	Q When was that?
6	A When I was around 12.
7	Q What did he show you?
8	A He showed me a picture of two people
9	having sex, and they had a really weird
10	expression on their face.
11	Q That was in your room, right?
12	A Yes, sir.
13	Q Only on one occasion?
14	A Yes, sir.
15	Q When you had this conversation with
16	your friend, the first person you told
17	about it, was that after she had told you that
18	something like that happened to her?
19	A We shared the same night, but I was
20	the first one to share.
21	Q Is it fair to say you bonded over
22	that?

1	A Yes.
2	Q Since this allegation came forward,
3	you've been appointed a guardian ad litem,
4	right?
5	A Yes.
6	Q That's Abigail Miller?
7	A Yes.
8	Q And, you have and your mother has
9	a lawyer, too, right?
10	A Yes.
11	Q And, you have a therapist?
12	A Yes.
13	Q And, you are getting to talk to the
14	therapist about this and other problems,
15	right?
16	A Yes.
17	Q And, this case, too, right?
18	A Yes.
19	Q And, Abigail Miller was appointed to
20	help you with the civil case that's related to
21	the facts of this case, right?
22	A Yes.

1	Q And, before the allegation you
2	didn't have any of those people to talk to,
3	did you?
4	A No.
5	Q It's helpful to get to talk to a
6	therapist, and have people trying to help you,
7	isn't it?
8	A Yes.
9	Q Does your guardian ad litem or
10	therapist talk to you about testifying in
11	court?
12	A Yes.
13	Q And, have they told you it's
14	important to maintain this version of events
15	and to bring it forward?
16	A No.
17	Q Have they told you you could get in
18	trouble for retracting or changing your
19	version of the events?
20	A No.
21	Q Do you believe that if you are
22	testifying under oath that it's a serious

1	matter?
2	A Yes.
3	Q Has anyone talked to you about that?
4	A Yes.
5	Q And, what have they have they
6	told you that testifying under oath is
7	something that once you do it you have to
8	stick with it?
9	A No.
10	Q No one has told you that?
11	A No.
12	Q You live with your mother now,
13	right?
14	A Yes, sir.
15	Q And, she says negative things about
16	your father to you, correct?
17	A No.
18	Q Never says that he's lazy?
19	A No.
20	Q Never talks about him with the
21	pornography?
22	A She's mentioned it a few times.

1	Q Okay.
2	MR. LEIBIG: Judge, may I have the
3	Court's indulgence for one moment?
4	THE COURT: Yes, sir.
5	BY MR. LEIBIG:
6	Q Just a couple questions about the
7	picture your father showed you. Was it from a
8	book?
9	A No.
10	Q Like a Polaroid?
11	A No.
12	Q Magazine?
13	A No.
14	Q What kind of picture was it?
15	A It was printed off the internet.
16	Q Okay. Did you ever see that picture
17	again?
18	A No.
19	Q What do you mean by the "faces were
20	weird"?
21	A The expression they had while they
22	were having intercourse. He showed me the

1	picture, saying this is something you could
2	do. And, the expression, the girl's
3	expression was painful.
4	Q When you told your friend, and
5	your church group, and the detective, about
6	this allegation, at that point you weren't
7	afraid your father was going to kill you,
8	right?
9	A No.
10	Q Okay. And, aside from the fact that
11	he's in jail, you are not afraid he's going to
12	try to kill you right now, that's fair enough,
13	right?
14	A I am.
15	Q Based on what?
16	A Based on the anger that I'm sure he
17	has towards me.
18	Q Why would you be sure of that?
19	A For telling the truth, and not
20	keeping it a secret anymore.
21	Q Other than that, is there something
22	in the past that you've seen him do that would

	make you chillik chac he would kill you of
2	anybody?
3	A No, just his anger.
4	Q About the coke and the spilled milk
5	and stuff?
6	A Yes.
7	Q Anything else you've seen him get
8	angry about, besides things like that?
9	A No.
10	Q You testified that your mother
11	usually tucked you in?
12	A Yes.
13	Q She didn't do that at 2:00 in the
14	morning, right?
15	A No.
16	Q Did she ever come into your room
17	late at night at all?
18	A No.
19	Q Okay, or did you ever
20	hear anybody walk into the bathroom?
21	A No.
22	Q Just one last piece, do you remember

1	what your bedtimes were starting from age 9,
2	what time did you go to bed around age 9?
3	A Around 9:30 or 10:00.
4	Q Okay. And then, when you were
5	around 11, did that get later?
6	A Maybe 10:30 or 11:00, but I never
7	went to bed later than that.
8	Q What about when you were 13?
9	A Around 11:00.
10	Q Okay. Around 11:00?
11	A Yes.
12	Q And, would still be awake
13	during the when you would usually go to
14	bed, right?
15	A Yes.
16	Q When would you wake up in the
17	morning during those times, age 9?
18	A Probably 7:30-ish, 8:00.
19	Q Age 11? Same?
20	A Yes.
21	Q You get up right before school,
22	whatever that time is.

1	A	Yes.
2	Q	And so, is it fair to say how did
3	you do in	n school during the 9 to 13 year old
4	time per	iod, pretty well?
5	A	Yes.
6	Q	Good grades, right?
7	A	Yes.
8	Q	Still getting good grades?
9	A	Yes.
10	Q	Have you had any problems since the
11	separatio	on at school?
12	A	No.
13	Q	Grade-wise?
14	A	No.
15	Q	Okay. Ever any complaints from your
16	teachers	about being tired at school?
17	A	No.
18	Q	But, you would be awake almost every
19	night dur	ring a four-year period from 2:00 to
20	5:00 in t	the morning, right?
21	A	Yes.
22	Q	That's all I have. Thank you.

1	REDIRECT EXAMINATION
2	BY MS. ASHWORTH:
3	Q did you ever look at the
4	clock when this started, and then check the
5	clock again?
6	A No.
7	Q You were talking about how long it
8	felt.
9	A How long it felt.
10	Q Okay. So, you are estimating
11	MR. LEIBIG: (INTERPOSING)
12	Objection, leading.
13	MS. ASHWORTH: (CONTINUING) I'm
14	trying to clarify.
15	THE COURT: I understand, but it is
16	leading.
17	BY MS. ASHWORTH:
18	Q Did you love your dad?
19	A Yes.
20	Q Do you still love your dad?
21	A Yes.
22	Q Did you know that this was wrong, or

1	bad?
2	A Yes.
3	Q You recall the meeting with
4	Detective Sansale?
5	A Yes, ma'am.
6	Q How long was that, approximately?
7	A About an hour and a half.
8	Q And, was it at the police station,
9	or was it at your house?
10	A It was at the station.
11	Q Okay. Now, this exhibit that
12	Counsel has given you, this house looks like
13	yours?
14	A For the most part, yes.
15	Q Okay. Was there just one window on
16	the top?
17	A Yes.
18	Q And, was that whose window was
19	that?
20	A My parents' bedroom.
21	Q Okay. And so, that would have been
22	up here?

Ţ	A Yes, ma'am.
2	Q Correct?
3	A Yes.
4	Q Where did this hallway lead to?
5	A The bedroom was longer, and the
6	hallway led to the hallway wasn't as long,
7	it was shorter, and it led to their room.
8	Q Okay. Do you know, if you went into
9	your parent's
10	MS. ASHWORTH: May I have the
11	exhibit that
12	BY MS. ASHWORTH:
13	Q Do you still have that picture?
14	A Yes, ma'am.
15	Q Can you draw on there how where
16	did the stairs come up? Did they come up
17	in this diagram it shows being stairs the
18	entire length of the house. Did they start on
19	the first floor, and they came up, did they
20	come up toward the master bedroom or toward
21	your bedroom?
22	A Toward my bedroom.

1	Q Okay, and so, where on this diagram
2	did the stairs come out? Where were you
3	upstairs on that diagram, when you came up to
4	the top of the stairs? Can you write top of
5	stairs there? Can you show us? Kind of in
6	the middle?
7	A Yes, ma'am.
8	Q Okay. Could you and then, can
9	you draw direction for down the stairs? If
10	you are standing there in the middle at the
11	top of the stairs, which direction goes down?
12	Is it toward the front of the house, where the
13	master bedroom is, or the back of the house?
14	A Towards the master bedroom.
15	Q Okay. So, when you came in that
16	front door, the stairs would be in front of
17	you or
18	A (INTERPOSING) They would be to the
19	right.
20	Q (CONTINUING) okay, when you walk
21	in the door the stairs were on the right.
22	A Yes, ma'am.

1	Q Okay. And then, did were there
2	any windows in your room?
3	A Yes.
4	Q How many?
5	A One.
6	Q Okay. How about in room?
7	A Yes.
8	Q How many?
9	A One.
10	Q And, was there a separate bathroom
11	for you and, or did you share the
12	bathroom with your parents?
13	A We shared the bathroom.
14	Q Okay, and where was the door to the
15	bathroom?
16	A Do you want me to write it on here?
17	Q Sure. Okay.
18	And, where was the door to the
19	master bedroom? Okay.
20	MS. ASHWORTH: No further questions.
21	MR. LEIBIG: Judge, can I have a
22	brief recross, only on the diagram piece?

1	RECROSS EXAMINATION
2	BY MR. LEIBIG:
3	Q Do you have a pen, ??
4	A No, I do not.
5	Q Okay. Can you draw in your room the
6	position of the bed?
7	And, are you familiar with the
8	position of the bed in room?
9	And, your parents' room?
10	Thank you.
11	MR. LEIBIG: Judge, I have no
12	further questions, and I would move for
13	admission of Defendant's Exhibits A and B.
14	MS. ASHWORTH: I have no objection.
15	(WHEREUPON, THE DOCUMENTS
16	REFERRED TO, PREVIOUSLY
17	MARKED DEFENDANT'S EXHIBITS A
18	AND B FOR IDENTIFICATION, WERE
19	RECEIVED IN EVIDENCE.)
20	THE COURT: Any other questions of
21	this witness?
22	MS. ASHWORTH: No, sir.

## **NEAL R. GROSS**
